

WHAT'S BEEN HAPPENING AT KFRC?

Last Fiscal Year (10/01/16 through 09/30/17):

- KFRC distributed "Welcome Baby" bags containing information on community resources to 334 families who gave birth at Aspirus Kewweenaw & U.P. Health System-Portage. Parents were also provided a free pass to the Tree House and the opportunity to sign up for the Parenting the 1st Year newsletter. This program is made possible in part through a collaboration with the Copper Country Great Start Collaborative (CCGSC) and funding from Copper Country Kiwanis, Michigan's Children Trust Fund (CTF) and Superior Child Abuse Prevention Council (SCAPC). Parenting the 2nd & 3rd Year newsletter is also available to families that subscribed to the 1st Year thanks to funding provided by the W.K. Kellogg Foundation. A total of 5079 Parenting the 1st Year and Parenting the 2nd & 3rd Year newsletters were distributed to area families last fiscal year.
- KFRC's Home-Based Educator provided 138 home visits to 20 preschool age children and their parents as well as to expectant mothers. This program is made possible through a partnership with BHK Child Development (BHK) and through funding from CTF and SCAPC.



• KFRC provided a total of 118 playgroups at 2 locations. The numbers are down from previous years due to some loss of funding. Still, we served a total of 135 families with 186 children with a total 1109 child visits at these socializations. Playgroups are made possible in part through a partnership with BHK, CCGSC and through private funding.


• 28 of the socializations were *Tummy Time* playgroups which are specific to babies up to age one and their families. Last fiscal year, Tummy Time served 31 families with 47 children with the number of child visits totaling 134. These sessions were made possible through

W.K. Kellogg Foundation.

•KFRC provided 12 "Playtime in the Park" outings at various local parks between June and August. A total of 71 families

with 124 children were served with the number of child visits totaling 339 (that's an average of 28+ kids per session!). Playtime is funded in part by BHK and CCGSC.

- KFRC provided up to 7 Tree House open sessions per week throughout the year. Last year, 370 families with 567 children attended open hours with the number of child visits totaling 1690.
- Last year, KFRC provided 32 area families with needed clothing, diapers and other items from the Baby & Maternity Closet. KFRC accepts a variety of baby item donations throughout the year, which, in turn are distributed to area families in need. A LOOK BACK AT SPECIAL PROGRAMS AND EVENTS

Literacy Events! Literacy begins long before a child enters school and is the basic building block of education. Studies show that reading and providing books to young children can positively impact a child's readiness to start school! In collaboration with the Copper Country Great Start Collaborative, the Portage Lake District Library, and the Great Start to Quality U.P. Resource Center, Relay for Life, Downtown Houghton Farmer's Market eight successful story walks were held last year. More than 200 hundred families joined us to walk through stories like "Dappled Apples", "Minerva

Louise", "What Dads Can't Do", "Farmer's Market Day" and "Going on a Bear Hunt".

Children from Kathy Wetton's 4th grade class from CLK Elementary School visited Playtime in the Park in June. The students read stories to 54 children at the park, and gave each child a book which included a handwritten note. Thanks to our many community collaborative partners more than more than

100 books were given away to families in 2017.



Graduation For 5 Year Olds!

On their 5th birthdays, children officially graduate from KFRC programs. In 2017, More than 250 registered KFRC kids graduate with several choosing to celebrate their very own "I'm Five!" Day at the Tree House where they receive a graduation cap and certificate.



A Visit From the Fire Department!

Last November, KFRC hosted a free playgroup with very special guests from the Houghton Fire Department. The fire fighters provided every child in attendance with a goodie bag, a fire hat and an awesome toy fire truck complete with a Dalmatian! The biggest hit of the evening was a hands on tour onboard one of the Department's fire trucks.



Annual Dinner Fundraiser Lumberjack Style!

In October 2017, KFRC held its annual fundraising dinner which was a Lumberjack theme. We had amazing support from businesses and individuals to help make this event a success including Pamela & Steve Hecht, owners of the Miners Café in Laurium who donated their amazing homemade Lumberjack Cookies for dessert; Mary and Jon Kangas, owners of the Brownstone Hall who donated the use of the hall and provided complimentary water, coffee and lemonade; and Jacie Williams who provided all of the awesome table decorations. All proceeds from the dinner went to support KFRC programming. A good time was had by all!



UNDERSTANDING ADVERSE CHILDHOOD EXPERIENCES (ACES)

What are ACEs?

ACEs are serious childhood traumas -- a list is shown below -- that result in toxic stress that can harm a child's brain. This toxic stress may prevent a child from learning, from playing in a healthy way with other children, and can result in long-term health problems.


Adverse Childhood Experience can include:

- emotional abuse
- physical abuse
- sexual abuse
- emotional neglect
- physical neglect
- mother treated violently
- household substance abuse
- household mental Illness
- parental separation/ divorce

- incarcerated household member
- bullying (by another child or adult)
- witnessing violence outside the home
- witness a brother or sister being abused
- racism, sexism, or any other form of discrimination
- being homeless
- natural disasters and war

How do ACEs affect health?

Through stress. Frequent or prolonged exposure to ACEs can create toxic stress which can damage the developing brain of a child and affect overall health.



A Survival Mode Response is one that increases heart rate, blood pressure, breathing and muscle tension. When a child is in survival mode, self-protection is their priority. In other words: "I can't hear you, I can't respond to you, I am just trying to be safe."

Resilience trumps ACEs

What is Resilience?

Resilience is the ability to adjust (or bounce back) when bad things happen. Research shows resilience helps reduce the effects of ACEs. Protective factors are internal and external resources that help us to build our resilience. Parents, teachers and caregivers can help children by:

- Gaining an understanding of ACEs
- Helping children identify feelings and manage emotions
- Creating safe physical and emotional environments at home, in school, and in neighborhoods


